I was a marine stationed at Marble Mountain air base in Vietnam in 1969. I believe the recovery record for James is incorrect. I was walking on the beach toward our NCO club at Marble Mountain when I saw what I thought was aguy sunbathing on the beach. I later observed from inside the club that this person had not moved since I last saw him. approached him and it was obvious he was deceased. I notified our medical unit and they recovered the body. I was later told it was a service member that had drowned a couple of days earlier at China Beach. The official version is that the Navy recovered him ten days later. I could not find a record of anyone else drowning at China Beach during that period, so I believe it must have been James. I did not know him in life, but I've thought of him often over the y ears and I'm so sorry for the loss endured by his family. I hope this does not bring up any bad memories, but I felt I needed to correct the record.

The serviceman, who went to Vietnam on Aug. 12 and was stationed at Da Nang, had some free time and was swimming with several other men.

It was apparent that he was in difficulty, and his comrades asked if he needed help. He replied, "No," but soon afterward he disappeared.

The body has not been recovered.

The serviceman was graduated from the Saratoga Springs High School in June, 1966, and before entering the service he was employed in the mail room of The Saratogian and in the sundries department at the Central Market. He joined the Air Force a year and a half ago.

In addition to his parents, survivors include two brothers, John and Nicholas Closson; two sisters, Mrs. James (Dawn) Lant, and Miss Nancy Closson, all of Saratoga Springs; his maternal grandfather, John Plue, Glens Falls; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Closson, Saratoga Springs; two aunts, Mrs. Sally Zeno, Fort Edward, and Mrs. Bucky LaPointe, South Glens Falls; two uncles, Raymond Closson, Glens Falls, and Donald Closson, Saratoga Springs, and 14 cousins.
